One year ago, four women who felt the need to lose weight formed a club in affiliation with TOPS, Inc., and the TOPS Trimmers of Livingston was begun.

Under leadership of Mrs. Victor Maue, who was elected president, the club grew in number from the original four (Mrs. Maue, Mrs. Eudora Moggio, Mrs. Jacqueline Tuske and Mrs. Opal Whitlock) to the present membership of 31.

The idea of TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly) was conceived in 1948 by Mrs. Esther Manz in Milwaukee, Wis., and has grown into a worldwide organization. TOPS revolves around the idea of group therapy.

Regular meetings of the Livingston TOPS Trimmers are held each Tuesday evening at the A. R. Graiff grade school

at 7 o'clock for one hour. Each member is privately weighed-in and the gains or losses are recorded. Fines are paid for pounds gained and different contests are promoted to stimulate losses. As each member reaches her ideal weight and remains at that weight, she becomes a member of KOPS (Keep Off Pounds Sensibly). Two members, Irene Maue and Fern Fech of Livingston, reached that status in the first six months with several other members nearly at their goal.

As the first year anniversary of the chapter draws to a close, the members report a total loss of 520 pounds for the group. On April 7 open house will be held in observance of the Trimmers first anniversary. Interested persons are asked to contact Mrs. Maue (phone NE 7-3742) or Mrs. Moggio (NE 7-3634).

Leota Painter of Staunton will represent the chapter at the annual convention in June at Kansas City. Mrs. Painter was chapter queen with a weight loss of 45 pounds for a six months period.

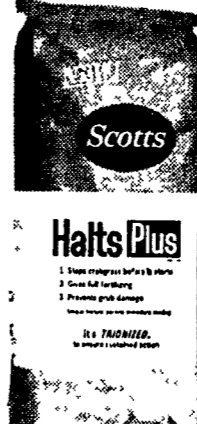
