Drug to Induce Vomiting Called Must for Homes

SPRINGFIELD—Parents with small children are urged to ask their family physician or pediatrician to supply them with one-half ounce of Syrup of Ipecac, which he may obtain from the local pharmacist, as an emetic to be kept in the home for emergency use in the event of accidental poisoning. The emetic, which will induce immediate vomiting, should be used only at a physician's direction.

This action is recommended by Dr. Franklin D. Yoder, director of the Illinois Department of Public Health, and the Illinois Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics' subcommittee on accidental poisoning as a feature of Poison Prevention Week which began Sunday.

The Department of Public Health and Dr. Ralph H. Kustadter, president of the Illinois Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, also recommend that a specific, approved type of activated charcoal be substituted for the "universal antidote" formerly recommended in poisoning emergencies.

Both Dr. Yoder and Dr. Kustadter urged calling a physician immediately for instructions in poisoning emergencies.

Accidental poisoning of children is a major health problem, both in Illinois and the nation, and adults are urged to keep all bottles of medicines, drugs and other potential poisons out of the reach of children, preferably in locked cabinets. Labels of all household preparations should be read and heeded.

Ex-SIU Alumni Director Found Guilty of Fraud

Wayne M. Mann, 42, former alumni director of Southern Illinois University, was convicted last week of one count of mail fraud and three counts of violating Securities Exchange Commission regulations.

Based on the convictions, Mann faces a possible sentence of 20 years in prison and a \$20,000 fine. The jury which convicted Mann of the four fraud charges in a Chicago United States District Court said they could not reach a decision on six other counts of a 10-count indictment charging him with a false mining venture promotion scheme.

Mann's attorneys have indicated they will appeal the unusual court decision in allowing convictions on some counts and dismissals of others.
